• Structures ideas in the order in	
which they appear.	
 Includes transitions such as 	
"According to" + the author's	
name to show that you are	
summarizing their ideas.	
 Stays concise and includes 	
enough information that	
someone unfamiliar with the	
article can still understand the	
ideas.
