Your notes will be divided into three categories: general questions (what it is); deep questions (what it means); and supporting details (why you think so).

	<i>I think the next chapter will tell us about...</i>

	• What examples can you give?	
	• Why do you think this is true?	
	• How do you know that?	
	• What evidence can you show?	
	• What facts support your ideas?
